Admission Policy

∼ Policy of acceptance ∼

Our Master Program provides interdisciplinary education covering a variety of academic fields. The goal is to train professionals and researchers to broaden knowledge in the fields of literature, law, and economics, so that they will eventually have excellent specialized knowledge in the field of their interest. Our graduates will develop their own perspectives and skills, and understand diversity in the context of global culture, and respond flexibly to our ever-changing society.

Our Doctoral Program is based upon the idea of "the creation of a symbiotic society." We aim at advancing our research through various and interdisciplinary approaches.

We welcome applications from domestic and oversea individuals, who have achieved the basic knowledge in their field of interests, and who intend to conduct active research with strong senses of direction and enthusiasms to tackle the hitherto unknown of unsolved problems.

Organizational Management Sciences and Regional Public Policy Management in our Master Program particularly focus on applications from individuals who strive to acquire more advanced management skills to benefit organizations, such as enterprises, and national and local government offices.

Curriculum policy (curriculum organization and implementation)

Our Master Program offers a multidisciplinary, comprehensive, and interdisciplinary education. It presupposes that students coming to our program have been trained at undergraduate schools such as the Faculty of Letters, Law, and Economics. In particular, the Organizational Management Sciences and Regional Public Policy Management courses have been structured, as a part of their training, to include field experiences in the public sector and in local business.

In accordance with our "creation of a symbiotic society" mission, our Doctoral Program offers a variety of graduate education programs and also supports research taking a multidisciplinary approaches, targeting cultures, organizations, individuals, communities, among others.

Entrance examination schedule/routine

From this year on, the screening for master's course will be held at each department and each course. Applicants may apply either for the "deep research studies program" or the "research program." For our Master Program, applications are accepted in September and also in February according to the admission qualifications: general screening exams, special screening exams for full-time workers, special screening exam for professionals, and special screening exam for international students. We call for applications for our doctoral program (including those who proceed to the next level) in February. For those international students who have already finished (or are close to finish) undergraduate degree at universities that have agreement with Okayama university, a separate entrance examination will be held for both master and doctoral course.




Master Program

Our Master Program consists of four departments: Basic Socio-Cultural Sciences, Comparative Socio-Cultural Sciences, Public Policy Sciences, and Organizational Management. These departments are serves as a continuation of undergraduate studies in the Faculty of Letters, Faculty of Law and Faculty of Economics. Moreover, in response to the request for a new education today, we systematically provide comprehensive and multidisciplinary academic education.



Doctoral Program

Our Doctoral Program consists solely of a department of Socio-Cultural Sciences. This department itself consists of three programs: Cultural Symbiotics (Human culture and Socio-cultural theory), Human Social Sciences (Japanese culture and Comparative social development theory), and Socio-Economic Planning and Policy Science (Public policy and Modern Corporations theory). In accordance with our mission "Building a Harmonious Society", we promote multidisciplinary academic approaches to the research in cultures, individuals, organizations, and local societies.

Research deepening program/ Profound research program?

This program is constituted of taking specialized courses and seminars, and writing original academic master thesis. It is suitable for those students whose aim is to acquire advanced knowledge and skills, technology and judgment in their specialized fields of interest, and for those students whose final goal is to obtain doctoral degree in a doctoral program. Primarily, it aims at training future teachers and researchers.

Research program

This program is completed upon creating a research report related to a specific topic, enrolling in numerous, extensive courses and seminars on a specialized topic. The program is suitable for students aiming to acquire specialized knowledge in their field, or for oversea students who wish to acquire knowledge in a variety of fields, starting with Japanese language and society. Primarily, it serves to train professionals with a high degree of expertise.

► Ikeda family collection:

Okayama University Library possesses various material and belongings of historic Okayama clans, from festive clothing of Marquis Ikeda to Ikeda family collection of books. Ever since 1632, when the feudal lord Ikeda Mitsumasa came to Okayama Castle on his way from Tottori, up until the abolition of feudal system, for 240 years, many of these treasures were kept in Okayama university library. There are only a handful of places in the whole country where the official documents about feudal clans' affairs, and ruling the local domains are preserved, and Okayama university library is one of them. These valuable academic information recourses are actively used in teaching undergraduate and graduate students. These collections are enriched with various documents from Mimasaka region, Miura family of old Katsuyama clan, and we continue with our work on investigating these regional materials.

► Geography:

Today, as the globalization advances, the importance of research on local biological topography (region) is more visible. Issues and phenomena in regions caused by globalization become clear when local regions are compared. The comparative study becomes therefore important not only with different regions of the world, but also with the daily lives of neighboring regions. So far, in the geography domain of human behavioral studies, there have been many researches focusing on the local industry and regional cities, located mainly in mountainous areas, and studying their societies, economics, and cultures. Furthermore, the research is also encouraged into diverse geographic phenomena, targeting different industrial regions, such as Canada, United States, China, India, and Australia.

In recent years, our research environment that allows great freedom has produced a number of researchers at various universities. This optimum research is guaranteed not only for those interested in the dynamics of regions but to all people striving towards becoming a researcher.

• Okayama University short-stay study program

30 universities in 11 countries have agreement with Okayama University on short-term study abroad program. Our students are exempt from the tuition fee at the host university.

• International exchange program based on inter department exchange agreements

Graduate School of Humanities and Social Sciences has agreements on international exchange with various oversea universities and is conducting active exchange programs. We practice a dual way degree system in cooperation with a number of schools in China, Korea and Taiwan.

I am currently involved in the promotion of community welfare in Okayama City Council of Social Welfare, after retiring from Okayama City Hall. During my tenure, I was responsible for urban development and civil cooperation, and similar pioneering fields, without fully understanding it, so it was all through trial and error.

And now, a course for researching regional public policy has been established.

To enter the Business School for the sole purpose of obtaining an MBA is not something I would suggest working people should do. Even though the classes are mainly on working nights or Saturdays, you lose a lot of sleep for doing homework and beforehand preparation. Also, the time you can spend with your family is severely limited. Furthermore, with such an absence of purpose, it is extremely

difficult to find a topic and complete a thesis.

On the other hand, to me, who wanted to solve the problems of work through research, business school became irreplaceable for my studying. The knowledge obtained through classes, and the papers of our predecessors, discussions with students from different backgrounds, and advice from our teachers with advanced knowledge in each field, all of that helped me learn and become aware of things that are not possible through simple everyday actions.

For businesspeople seeking knowledge, two years of learning in a graduate school will definitely be meaningful/worthwhile.

Graduate School of Humanities and Social Sciences was established for the purpose of succession and development of knowledge in the fields of humanities, and it also aims to return the knowledge to the region. 
